Thank you. I must say I am truly honored to be the recipient of the Jae Won Lee Distinguished Service Award this year. When **Dr. Taehyun Kim (California State U – Northridge)**, the award committee chair called to tell me that I had been nominated, I was taken aback – there was a moment of silence followed by my awkward laughter. He might have been a bit embarrassed, but the truth is, it was too good to believe, and I was not sure I deserved it. Nevertheless, an inner voice said, 'Jin-Ae, someone nominated you because they saw your heart. Don't be shy. Be brave – accept this honor and live your life as a leader worthy of it.'

That was one of the yeses that I said to the KACA. Indeed, many wonderful things have happened when I said "yes" to the invitation to serve. In August 2018, I sat in the back of the ballroom at the opening session of KACA's 40th anniversary conference in Washington DC. In the session, all the KACA's leaders sat in one place. I felt both intimidated and excited, marveled that KACA had reached this milestone. I thought about the leaders who had founded and sustained this association for four decades. I silently prayed, "I want to be a part of this great community. What should I do? I would love to serve like these leaders – but maybe ten years later when I turn 50, since I don't feel ready now." Though that prayer was only a few seconds long, I never forgot it. Opportunities to serve arose sooner than I expected even if I didn't feel ready.

Since then, I have said "yes" to opportunities to serve KACA. Looking back, I am grateful to so many fellow KACA leaders and members. For example, **Dr. Chang Wan Woo (James Madison U)** invited me to his KACA-ICA committee; that was my first "yes" to KACA. Working together at the 2018 ICA conference in Prague was an absolute joy. I discovered a knack for collecting membership dues, haha! **Dr. Seungahn Nah (U of Florida)** later invited me to be nominated for the KACA-ICA VP in 2019, and **Dr. Eyun-Jung Ki (U of Alabama)** and **Dr. Moon J. Lee (Syracuse U)** encouraged me to run for president in 2021. Without their invitation and encouragement, I would not have moved forward.

Years of my service in KACA, though, have been marked by perseverance. I needed unwavering optimism and hope – values handed down by past leaders and strengthened by the officers I have worked with. I needed those who would say "yes" to serve.

With that being said, I am grateful to those who accepted my invitation to serve. **Dr. David Do Kyun Kim (University of Louisianna- Lafayette)** took on the role of inaugural editor-inchief of the *Korean Journal of Communication*, even without a publisher contract in place, bringing an optimism that lifted us all. **Dr. Yeonsoo Kim (University of Texas – Austin)** played a pivotal role in connecting KACA with the University of Texas Press, stepping up and taking an action at just the right time. **Dr. YoungJu Shin (George Washington University)** has supported me since we first connected through KACA's global outreach committee in 2018, even arranging the conference venue for KACA on her campus in Washington DC these days.

I deeply appreciate my past officers and current KACA conference planning committee members. Their expertise, passion, encouragement, and friendship have made me feel wiser and more confident than I ever could have been alone. This has never been a solo effort; we've achieved everything as a team, and I feel incredibly lucky to work alongside such talented and resourceful people.

Sometimes, unexpected "yeses" have come to KACA without even asking. **Dr. David Jeong** (Santa Clara University) reached out to establish a scholarship for KACA student members – and now we have David Tae Yong Cho Memorial Scholarship. **Dr. Nojin Kwak** (SUNY-Buffalo) consistently supported us with conference reception sponsorships. A year ago, he and **Dr. Dal Yong Jin (Simon Fraser University)** shared the vision for KACA's annual conferences and secured funding for our future. How could I turn it down when their vision aligned so perfectly with our next steps? I can only say thank you to every one of you.

Above all, I am thankful to KACA's founding father, **Dr. Jae Won Lee, and his family** for their dedication to KACA. I sometimes try to imagine the courage it must have taken for him to establish this association nearly 50 years ago when there were only a handful of Korean scholars in the US. His service extended beyond the Korean scholarly community, leaving a legacy that stands as a true example of leadership for Korean communication scholars and beyond.

I am also grateful to my director at ECU's School of Communication, **Dr. Laura Prividera** for supporting my KACA-related travels and reducing some of my internal service responsibilities so I could focus on KACA. Sometimes, they had so much fun without me. Their adventures even made me a bit jealous at times.

In closing, KACA has truly been a home away from home. I once thought I was serving this community, but I now realize how deeply I've been blessed by it. This community reminds me of who I am and where my academic life is rooted. The mentors and friends I've found in KACA constantly inspire me to be a better scholar, a stronger leader, and a better human. Thank you, KACA members. I promise to live as a leader worthy of this honorable award. Now I invite each of you to serve KACA and beyond – will you join us?
